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
ARTIST GRATEFUL FOR A 'DO-OVER'



David Drummond

For nearly three decades, renowned artist David Drummond has created stunning paintings of desert landscapes. One recent morning, while lying in bed at his home near Page, Arizona, David noticed his heart felt strange. The next moment, it stopped.

A helicopter whisked David to Dixie Regional Medical Center, 150 miles away. Emergency responders restarted his heart. But upon landing, his heart stopped beating again.

David was again revived and rushed into surgery, where cardiologist Dr. David Boorman worked to repair what was discovered to be total blockage of the right coronary artery. While the operation was successful, it was initially unclear how much damage had occurred to David's brain.

But soon it became clear that the artist's recovery was all but miraculous. Within only a day, David was able to talk. He continued to make so much progress that soon, he was enjoying visiting with friends and family. Nurses had to admonish him to stifle his laughter, to avoid bruising his tender ribs.

David spent a week in the hospital. He and his wife Priscilla were so impressed by the care he received, they decided to remain in St. George and complete David's cardiac rehabilitation at Dixie Regional.

After rehab, the Drummonds were thrilled to learn that an ultrasound revealed no major damage to David's heart. In gratitude, the Drummonds decided to support the new cardiovascular hybrid surgical suite that is being developed as part of the Dixie Regional expansion project. The new surgical suite will be a state of the art setting for new heart-saving procedures, such as hybrid coronary revascularization and percutaneous valve replacement.

As David's heart continues to heal, David has returned to his brushes and paints. The first piece he created after returning home depicts the colorful cliffs of Mountain Sheep Canyon reflected in the waters of Lake Powell. The beautiful watercolor was auctioned at the Jubilee of Trees, Dixie Regional's annual five-day holiday fundraiser.

Just as a portrait can be redrawn or a landscape sketched from a new angle, David is grateful for the opportunity to restart a healthy life. He says, "I feel as though I have been given a do-over. It's a miracle I'm here and healthy today."

INSURING A HEALTHY COMMUNITY: MEET SCOTT & DEBBIE KELLER


Scott Keller has spent a lot of time in hospitals. His first wife, Marilyn, fought a long, unsuccessful battle with cancer. "I know what it is like to be a caregiving spouse hoping for a miracle," he says. "That experience gave me an insight into patient care I will never forget."

Years later, Scott remarried and again experienced caregiving for a spouse, this time at Dixie Regional. "From the minute Debbie and I walked in the experience was incredible," he says. "While the medical care was excellent, it was the way we were treated that made the biggest impact."

Eventually, the Kellers attended a Jubilee of Trees event, and met others who were passionate about the hospital. Scott recalls, "When I was asked if I would serve on the hospital's Community Development Board, I was honored. Then they asked me to help with fundraising for the hospital expansion project, and it was an easy yes."

Scott and Debbie have great confidence in the vision and future of Dixie Regional. Together, they chose to contribute their time, leadership talents, and financial resources. True to Scott's roots as an insurance executive, the Kellers are investing in the future of Dixie Regional Medical Center, helping to insure a healthy community for years to come.

LARRY GABRIEL: GOING THE ROUNDS WITH CANCER

Over the course of 14 long years, Larry Gabriel underwent numerous treatments for cancer, including surgeries, chemotherapy, and radiation. He was a patient at many renowned institutions, and was treated by some of the best doctors available. Unfortunately, the prognosis for his type of cancer was so poor that doctors feared there wasn't much more they could do.

Then Larry met Lincoln Nadauld, MD, PhD, head of Intermountain Precision Genomics, based at Dixie Regional Medical Center. Dr. Nadauld ordered next-generation sequencing of Larry's

tumor tissue. The genetic test identified mutations that helped Dr. Nadauld develop new treatments specifically targeted to the unique tumor. Larry is now disease-free and has been for several years.

"I give Dr. Nadauld and Intermountain all the credit in the world for saving my life with this new approach," Larry says. "I received care at some of the best hospitals in the world, but the treatment I received here is something none of them offered. Thank you."


