Your gift is making a lasting difference

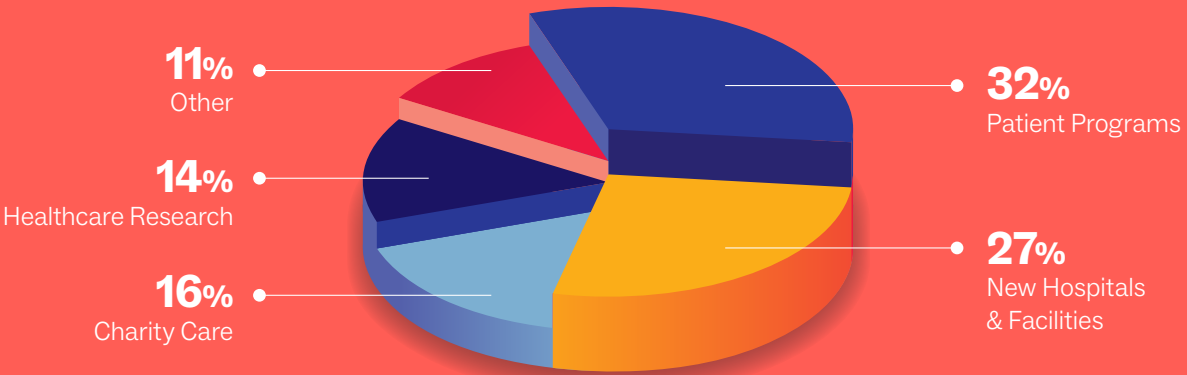
Every dollar entrusted to Intermountain Foundation — whether through a capital contribution, an annual cash donation, or a bequest — powers our mission of *helping people live the healthiest lives possible®*.

In 2024, over **\$100 million** was contributed across Intermountain Health to fuel our important work.

Right here in the Canyons Region, which includes Utah and Idaho, your generosity — alongside the support of **33,541** others — is transforming countless lives in our communities. In total, over **\$88.1 million**, including a \$25 million appropriation from the State of Utah, was committed through **100,511** gifts, demonstrating the incredible power of your collective giving.

The impact of your giving

Beyond the philanthropic contributions received, **\$58.9 million** was spent to support and expand access to outstanding patient care and vital programs across the organization.

From Crisis to Care

Brent and Ann Wilson are committed to connecting families with pediatric behavioral health resources

Brent and Ann know all too well how behavioral health crises take their toll, not only on those directly impacted, but also on family, friends, and loved ones. They've experienced firsthand the uncertainty and helplessness of not knowing where to turn for answers.

"I felt like we were searching for resources — desperately searching," Ann recalled, reflecting on their journey. "It's really hard to make decisions when you're in crisis yourself, and you don't know what to do." After navigating their own hardships, Brent and Ann realized the life-changing impact of the right resources at the right time. "Our approach to supporting our child during their difficult time would have been different had that access been available," Ann admitted.

Today, those resources are a reality, and the new Primary Children's Hospital Behavioral Health Center in Taylorsville, Utah, will be a big step forward. The center, set to open in late 2025, will help kids and teens get the care they need, acting as the hub of Intermountain Children's Health's behavioral health services and coordinating programs across a seven-state area. To realize this future, strong, visionary leadership and support are essential.

Brent and Ann's commitment to this vital cause inspired them to establish a first-ever presidential endowed chair — the Brent and Ann Wilson Presidential Endowed Chair in Pediatric Behavioral Health. "You need to have the right clinical leaders in place to build the rest of the program's structure," Brent explained, emphasizing a need for far-reaching expertise to tackle the ongoing behavioral health crisis in the Mountain West.

In their own experience, the act of giving has brought immense fulfillment. "We get back more than we give," Brent shared. The Wilsons also note that every contribution, no matter the size, helps build a stronger community of support. "It takes a village to raise a kid," Brent said. "The more hands that can help, the better."

Navigating a behavioral health crisis can be incredibly challenging. "That's why this center will be so great," Ann shared. "It's going to provide a place where families can go, and experts can say, 'You could use this resource, and that resource, and this will be helpful.'"

The couple's advice to others facing a behavioral health crisis is simple yet powerful: "You just have to love them — and you have to never give up."

Expanding Pediatric Behavioral Health Services

Access to the right care, at the right time and place, is critical to addressing the growing youth behavioral health crisis. Nationally, 1 in 5 children, ages 3 to 17, faces a mental, emotional, developmental, or behavioral disorder.

Fueled by your philanthropy, Intermountain Children's Health is expanding its entire network, bringing life-changing, evidence-based care closer to home for children and families when they need it most.

Current and Expanding Programs Offered Through Primary Children's Hospital:

- A new Pediatric Behavioral Health Center in Taylorsville
- Partial-hospitalization programs with crisis and day tracks at multiple locations, now including St. George
- A dedicated behavioral health floor at Miller Family Campus
- Integrated mental health in pediatric specialty clinics and crisis services offered at the Salt Lake Campus

To meet the urgent need for youth behavioral healthcare, we're building a new Primary Children's Hospital Behavioral Health Center in Taylorsville, Utah. Opening in late 2025, the \$100 million project, partly funded by the State of Utah's \$25 million investment, will offer a crisis walk-in center, additional inpatient beds, enhanced outpatient care, and the first dedicated space for behavioral health crisis stabilization designed for youth with autism and neuro-diverse needs. Our family-centered care model ensures parents play a key role in their child's treatment.

Telecrisis care teams—Bringing help and hope to more families

Telemedicine is transforming pediatric behavioral healthcare by providing cost effective, around-the-clock access regardless of a child's location. It allows our caregivers to provide critical guidance and ensures children receive the treatment they need, no matter where they live.

Intermountain Children's Health Telecrisis Care teams will soon offer 24/7 support every day of the year. With standardized clinical guidelines and "zero suicide" protocols, these teams will provide immediate assistance, follow-up referrals, coordinated psychiatric hospital admissions, and much more.

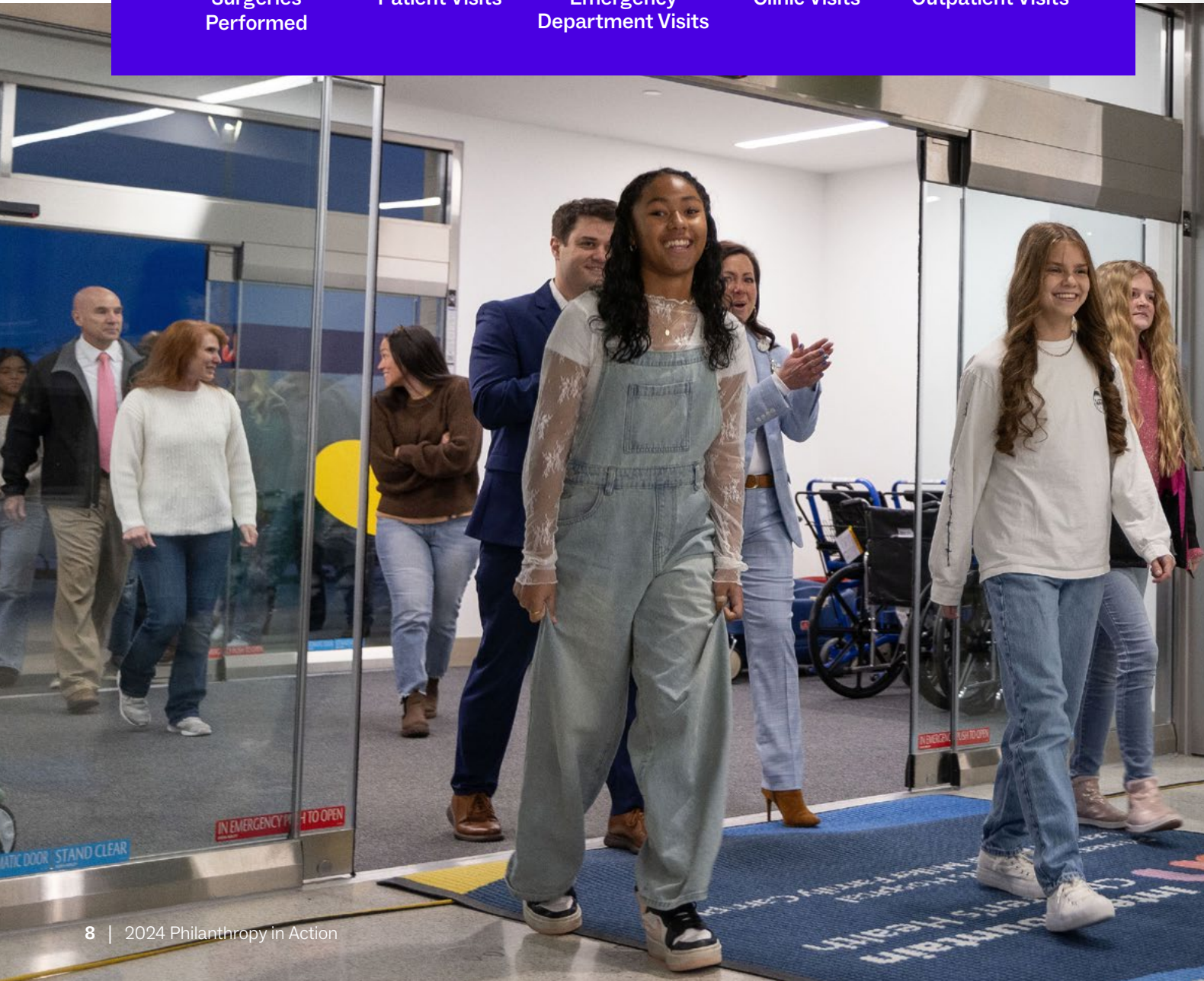
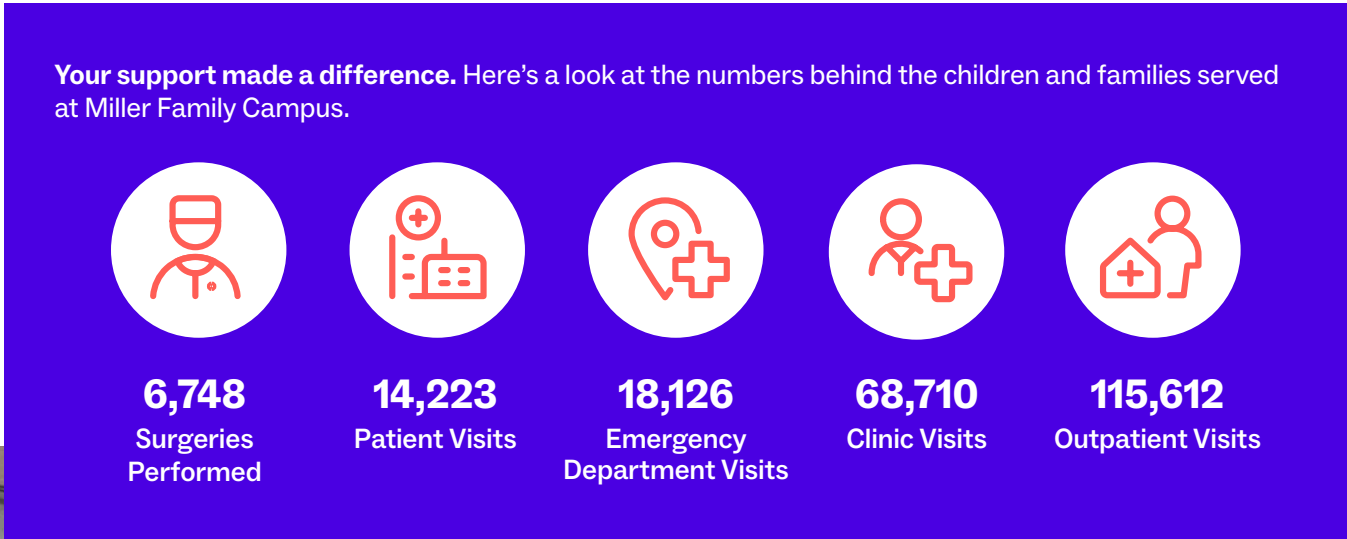

Fighting Cancer, Inspiring Hope

Craig and Diane Shanklin transform personal struggles into a mission of healing and impact

Two and a half years ago, the Shanklin family's lives were shaken when Craig was diagnosed with prostate cancer. The diagnosis was heartbreakingly familiar. Craig's 93-year-old father is battling the same illness, and Di lost her father to prostate cancer.

Despite the challenges, the Shanklins have found purpose in their journey, channeling their struggles into meaningful action driven by three pillars: investing in their health, impactful giving, and educating and empowering others.

Invest in Your Health

"My dad is famous for saying, 'There is nothing more important than your health. Without your health, you have nothing,'" Craig shares. And the couple's experience underscored the importance of collaboration in healthcare.

Their vision champions a system where doctors, specialists, and support teams work seamlessly to provide clear, coordinated care. "It's about creating a system where patients have all the information and support they need in one place," he says.

Impactful Giving

As donors, the Shanklins have seen how their contributions are maximized at Intermountain Health.

"People don't appreciate how far your dollar gets stretched here and the impact it can have," they explain. "That charity dollar that you have is not going to go any further than it would here."

Di's role as a board member has deepened her confidence in the healthcare system. "It's been amazing to see the dedication and vision of the hospital's leadership," she shares. "It gives us so much confidence in the work being done and the real impact our contributions have on people's lives."

Educate and Empower

The Shanklins are passionate about raising awareness around the many resources available for cancer patients and their families. "I can't think of anybody that's not touched by cancer in some way," Di says. After Craig's diagnosis, they helped found a prostate cancer support group to provide a safe space for patients and families to share experiences and explore treatment options.

They've also empowered the broader community to be part of the solution through novel events.

In November, they helped lead the "Cars, Coffee, and Cancer" Porsche Club of America (PCA) car show at the Intermountain Health Cancer Center in St. George. Partnering with the Intermountain Foundation, the PCA, and Gaudin Porsche of Las Vegas, the Shanklins have continued to lead.

Through resilience and determination, the Shanklins have transformed their battle with cancer into a mission of hope. Their efforts are reshaping the prostate cancer landscape, raising awareness, and improving care for patients and families. They are living proof that even in the face of life's greatest challenges, compassion and purpose can create a legacy that touches countless lives and builds a brighter, healthier future for all.

Intermountain Health is expanding cancer treatment to deliver comprehensive, integrated care close to home. A strategic effort to scale services is bringing new capabilities to communities across a seven-state region, advancing treatments, pursuing novel cures, educating and empowering patients, supporting emotional well-being, and guiding individuals from early detection to survivorship.

Current Cancer Care and Future Growth Initiatives:

- The Intermountain Health Flagship Cancer Hospital will provide highly complex surgery treatments, subspecialty oncology, clinical trials, and patient support while guiding all Intermountain Cancer Centers to ensure state-of-the-art treatment is accessible without travel.

- Regional Cancer Centers will provide access to medium complexity surgical treatments, specialized radiation and medical oncology treatments, overseen by the Flagship.
- Small and Community Cancer Centers will offer infusion treatments and have teleoncology support to keep care close to home.

This commitment streamlines cancer care, eliminating fragmentation and improving access to top experts in the field, supported by a team of specialists. By integrating expertise with innovation, Intermountain Health provides high-quality, accessible care that supports patients at every stage of their journey.

A new home for healing

McKay-Dee Hospital's new Cancer Center, opened in March 2024, is a testament to the power of generosity and innovation, bringing world-class cancer care to Northern Utah. Backed by over \$4 million in donor

support, this state-of-the-art facility offers advanced technology and a healing-focused design, creating a place of strength, comfort, and community for every cancer journey.
